

ANNE RAMBERG

Biographical Details

Anne Ramberg is the Secretary General of the Swedish Bar Association since 2000 following 23 years as a practising lawyer. In addition she has served as Chair of the Stockholm Section of the Swedish Bar Association and as a Council Member of the Swedish Bar Association. She has also held positions as a Member of the Swedish Press Council and the Chair of the Lawyers Association, Stockholm.

Anne Ramberg is a member of the Judicial Appointments Committee advising the Swedish Government on appointment of judges. She also serves as a Member of the Ethics Advisory Council of the National Police Board.

Mrs Ramberg is also a Board Member of several other Associations such as The Association for Legislative Theory and of one of the most prestigious Law Libraries in Sweden. She is further Secretary of a prestigious law research foundation.

Mrs Ramberg holds a LLB from the University of Stockholm 1976. She has been a Member of the Swedish Bar Association since 1981. She serves as Council Member and Member of the Managing Board of the International Bar Association and is a Council Member elect of the Human Rights Institute. She is also a Council Member and Treasurer of the International Legal Assistance Consortium, ILAC, and a Delegate to the Council of the Bars and Law Societies of the European Union, (CCBE). Anne Ramberg is the current Chair of Chief Executives of European Bar Associations, (CEEBA).

In the last few years Mrs Ramberg has served as an expert to several Governmental Committees e.g. for Judicial Appointments Reform and for the Re-Organisation of the lower court system as well as the Constitutional Reform Committee. She has written extensively on a variety of legal issues both in legal and general publications. She is a frequent participant in the public debate on legal issues in Television and Radio media and an Editor of the “The Advocate”, a leading monthly legal magazine published by the Bar.

Mrs Ramberg holds H.M. The King’s Medal for “distinguished contribution to the Swedish Judicial System”.
