











Only 10% of U.S. lawyers want to work from home full-time. Most want to return to the workplace, but with critical changes.


DO YOU PREFER TO GO BACK TO THE OFFICE OR CONTINUE TO WORK FROM HOME?

9 Professional development/coaching	28%





COCKPIT OFFICE & OPEN PLAN





DENSIFICATION TAKES A HIATUS








VERTICAL SEPARATION

Consider adding low panels or separations between people. Glass stacker panels provide an extra layer of protection between people while still letting in light.

COLLABORATION AT A DISTANCE



Remove excess chairs in conference rooms with more than 10 seats.



Spread out collaboration seating, so people are spaced further apart.



Encourage people to collaborate virtually whenever possible.






