Item 4: Interactive Dialogue with the UN Special rapporteur on the Human Rights Situation in Cambodia

Joint Oral Statement

The International Bar Association's Human Rights Institute, Lawyers for Lawyers, and Lawyers' Rights Watch Canada, welcome the Special Rapporteur's report.¹

We appreciate the recent communication on the challenges facing lawyers and access to justice in Cambodia, addressing concerns on lack of investment in legal aid. Combined with the reduction of international funding, this issue is leaving thousands without access to justice, disproportionately affecting marginalised groups and undermining fair trial rights.

Cambodia's justice system requires dedicated attention. The country lacks enough lawyers to meet the demands, and those who take on sensitive cases are isolated, under-resourced, socially discriminated, and harassed. The absence of a strong, independent legal community erodes trust in the rule of law.

While attention is focused on peace at the Cambodia–Thailand border, we receive troubling reports of arbitrary arrests for expressing opinions about the conflict. With no independent legal aid network in place, only a handful of lawyers can afford defending basic rights without pay, making the legal defence unsustainable.

Lawyers are critical to the defence of human rights defenders. Therefore, we urge the international community to work with Cambodia and civil society to build an independent, resilient legal profession to protect rights of everyone without fear of retaliation.
